Every review in the book includes two parts and a publisher's description (which appears in the Appendix)--a section which depicts the extent to which the emphasis on content and process is given to each of the topics in the textbooks reviewed, and a section which includes topics on content and processes which might be found only in teachers' editions. The book does not make assessments regarding the quality of the books reviewed, but rather provides information which teachers may find useful in making quality judgments and selecting specific textbooks for English programs.
