- JOURNALISTIC REPORTS
- GOVERNMENT DOCUMENTS
- PERSONAL NARRATIVES AND BLOGS

THE PROBLEM ARISES WHEN THESE DOCUMENTS:

1. PRESENT A BIASED OR INCOMPLETE PERSPECTIVE
2. ARE AUTHORED BY INDIVIDUALS OR ORGANIZATIONS WITH PARTICULAR AGENDAS
3. ARE SHARED WITHOUT CONTEXT OR CRITICAL ANALYSIS
4. ARE TAKEN AS DEFINITIVE OR COMPREHENSIVE REPRESENTATIONS

CONSEQUENCES OF RELYING ON A SINGLE STORY PDF

REINFORCEMENT OF STEREOTYPES AND PREJUDICE

IMPACT ON EDUCATION AND CRITICAL THINKING

PROMOTING DIVERSITY OF NARRATIVES

ENCOURAGE THE CONSUMPTION OF MULTIPLE PDFs FROM VARIOUS AUTHORS, REGIONS, AND VIEWPOINTS TO BUILD A MORE COMPREHENSIVE UNDERSTANDING. THIS INCLUDES:

- READING DIFFERENT CULTURAL OR IDEOLOGICAL PERSPECTIVES
- ENGAGING WITH STORIES FROM MARGINALIZED GROUPS
- SEEKING OUT ALTERNATIVE REPORTS OR ANALYSES

CREATING AND SHARING INCLUSIVE CONTENT

CONTENT CREATORS HAVE A RESPONSIBILITY TO:

- PRESENT BALANCED AND NUANCED NARRATIVES
- AVOID STEREOTYPES AND OVERSIMPLIFICATIONS
