- IN CORNWALL, SIMILAR SPIRITS CALLED KNOCKERS ARE ASSOCIATED WITH MINES AND ARE BELIEVED TO WARN OF DANGER.

MYTHIC SITES AND THEIR LEGENDS

1. STONEHENGE

THE PREHISTORIC STONE CIRCLE IS SHROUDED IN MYSTERY AND MYTH.

LEGENDS AND THEORIES:

- BUILT BY GIANTS OR DRUIDS AS A SACRED SITE.

3. THE FAIRY POOLS OF SKYE

INFLUENCE OF FOLKLORE ON MODERN CULTURE
