A primeira edição impressa foi lançada pela Kinoruss em 2016 quando dos trinta anos da morte do cineasta ocorrido em Paris, em 29 de dezembro de 1986. De lá para cá foi realizada uma segunda edição e ainda uma reimpressão em 2022, trazendo o selo comemorativo dos 90 anos de Tarkóvski, que consta também nessa edição digital. O livro traz doze ensaios de autores do Brasil, da Espanha e da Europa do Leste, selecionados a partir dos sete números dos Cadernos de Pesquisa Kinoruss, publicados ao longo de seis anos e aqui reunidos em

um único volume. Os textos de autoria estrangeira foram traduzidos para o português diretamente de suas respectivas línguas de origem: russo, espanhol e inglês, conforme o caso.
