PRODUCTION CHALLENGES AND CREATIVE CHOICES

DURING PRODUCTION, THE FILMMAKERS FACED BUDGET CONSTRAINTS BUT MANAGED TO CRAFT A FILM THAT BALANCED PRACTICAL EFFECTS WITH THEATRICAL FLAIR. THE DECISION TO MAKE JASON A RESURRECTED ZOMBIE WAS A DELIBERATE MOVE TO ADD SUPERNATURAL ELEMENTS, SETTING IT APART FROM EARLIER INSTALLMENTS ROOTED MORE IN REALISTIC HORROR.
