APPLICATIONS OF THE SDQRA IN EDUCATIONAL SETTINGS

SCREENING AND IDENTIFICATION OF READING LEVELS

POTENTIAL FOR MISCLASSIFICATION

THE SDQRA HAS PLAYED A PIVOTAL ROLE IN SAN DIEGO'S LITERACY INITIATIVES BY ENABLING EARLY DETECTION OF READING DIFFICULTIES. EARLY INTERVENTION CORRELATES STRONGLY WITH IMPROVED ACADEMIC OUTCOMES, REDUCING LONG-TERM LITERACY GAPS.

DESPITE ITS BENEFITS, RELIANCE SOLELY ON THE SDQRA MAY OVERLOOK THE MULTIFACETED NATURE OF READING DEVELOPMENT. MOVING FORWARD, INTEGRATING IT INTO A BROADER ASSESSMENT FRAMEWORK THAT INCLUDES COMPREHENSION AND FLUENCY MEASURES IS VITAL. MOREOVER, ONGOING TRAINING FOR EDUCATORS ENSURES CONSISTENT ADMINISTRATION AND INTERPRETATION.
