Rodef Tzedek synagogue has provided a home for secular and other faith-based organizations in northern Manhattan. This community center would become a city on a hill, a model of interfaith cooperation. Two tragedies spoke out against this wonderful milestone: the shooting of Michael Brown, an African American man in Ferguson, Missouri; and the murder of Tina Fontaine, a young indigenous girl in Winnipeg, Manitoba. As Rabbi Levin comes to terms with these senseless deaths, he reflects upon the events of his past that have molded his passion for social justice. Isaac Levin's human rights odyssey begins in the suburbs of St. Louis during the Civil Rights Movement.
