While fairy tales have remained popular in current culture in fictional retellings, movies, cartoons and opera, there has been no modern extended psychoanalytic interpretation of fairy tales. Psychoanalytic theory has broadened considerably in the last decades to include ideas about gender, sexuality, race, social conflict, and disorganized personality than the traditional Freudian focus on Oedipal development. This new book aims to add meaning that captures the deeper traumatic nature of human life. The author examines the multiple variations of myths and tales, both within a nationality, and across nationalities.
