Snažil jsem se, aby nepřekládaná slovíčka odpovídala přibližně úrovni intermediate (středně pokročilý), zvýrazněná slova tuto úroveň překračují. Česko-anglickou část berte pouze jako „zahřívací“, myslím si totiž, že jednojazyčný text vybavený odpovídajícím slovníčkem je mnohem efektivnější, čtenář si novou slovní zásobu osvojuje přímo, bez zprostředkování leckdy problematického překladu; anglickou anekdotu někdy opravdu nelze přeložit, aniž by se pointa nevytratila. Existuje i další důvod, proč anekdoty nepřekládat. Říká se, že anekdoty jsou jenom dvojí: slušné a dobré. Nelze se proto vyhnout textům s explicitním výrazivem, jenže – jak takové vtipy přeložit? Čeština i angličtina v takových situacích používají úplně odlišné obraty, což by bylo v překladech zavádějící. Jak říkával Jan Werich – tam kde Češi vyměšují, Anglosasové mužní.
