Ichabod is far from being a hero, an antihero or anything similar. It's basically a walking satire. Irving describes us as an ungainly schoolmaster, tyrant with his students, poor, interested, credulous, and with a great insatiable stomach, who will look kindly on woo a beautiful young woman whose wedding would mean having at his disposal rich delicacies all the days. The most peculiar of his character is his taste for horror stories, which enrapture him as much as they scare him, and his trickery - which equals or even surpasses that of those around him. It will be with him that we will get to know the territory of Sleepy Hollow and the terrible rider without a head, until we reach an end that will not stop smiling.
