While Schwarz's plan was never implemented, it enjoyed sufficient support to prompt government research into its feasibility, and years of debate. McKittrick shows how white farmers rallied around a plan that represented their interests over those of the South African state and delves into the reasons behind this schism between expert opinion and public perception. This backlash against the predominant scientific view, McKittrick argues, displayed the depth of popular mistrust in an expanding scientific elite. A detailed look at

the intersection of a settler society, climate change, white nationalism, and expert credibility, *Green Lands for White Men* examines the reverberations of a scheme that ultimately failed but influenced ideas about race and the environment in South Africa for decades to come.
