Another key proposal is that other means of resolving disputes, outside of formal adjudication, should be used wherever possible. An earlier report, *Renting homes* (Law Com. 297, Cm. 6781, ISBN 9780101678124) made recommendations for the simplification of current housing law and practice, and implementation of those proposals would improve the position in relation to disputes.
