- HEALTHY SNACKS: PROVIDE HEALTHY SNACKS DURING THE DAY AND ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO MAKE HEALTHY CHOICES WHEN SELECTING FOOD.
- PHYSICAL ACTIVITY: INCLUDE REGULAR PHYSICAL ACTIVITIES, SUCH AS OUTDOOR PLAY, DANCE, OR STRUCTURED GAMES, TO PROMOTE FITNESS AND WELL-BEING.

FOSTERING EMOTIONAL SAFETY

- ACTIVE LISTENING: PRACTICE ACTIVE LISTENING TECHNIQUES TO SHOW CHILDREN THAT THEIR FEELINGS AND THOUGHTS ARE VALUED. RESPOND THOUGHTFULLY TO THEIR CONCERNS.
- POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT: USE POSITIVE REINFORCEMENT TO ENCOURAGE DESIRED BEHAVIORS. ACKNOWLEDGE CHILDREN'S EFFORTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS, NO MATTER HOW SMALL.
- CONFLICT RESOLUTION: TEACH CHILDREN EFFECTIVE CONFLICT RESOLUTION SKILLS. ENCOURAGE THEM TO EXPRESS THEIR FEELINGS AND WORK THROUGH DISAGREEMENTS CONSTRUCTIVELY.

ASSESSING COMPETENCY IN CDA STATEMENT 1

- CONDUCT SURVEYS OR INFORMAL DISCUSSIONS WITH PARENTS AND COLLEAGUES TO GATHER FEEDBACK ON THE ENVIRONMENT YOU PROVIDE. THIS CAN HELP IDENTIFY STRENGTHS AND AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT.
- ENCOURAGE CHILDREN TO EXPRESS THEIR FEELINGS ABOUT THEIR ENVIRONMENT. THEIR PERSPECTIVES CAN PROVIDE VALUABLE INSIGHTS INTO HOW SAFE AND SUPPORTED THEY FEEL.
